•is an explicitly identified activity from a District Adopted Curriculum

examples: Home Economics class

•identified special education goal or program outcome

examples: Life skills job training

Developmental Pre-school social skills lessons

Supplementally Significant - Allowed (1 - 2 activities per class/team per semester/sports season)

culminating celebrations or recognition events

examples: End of sports season awards banquet

8th grade graduation tea

• teacher identified activities connected to District Adopted curriculum

examples: Making butter when studying pioneers

Celebrating the 100th day of school

Not Significant - Prohibited (These and similar uses of food are not permitted at any time)

prizes for drawings or short term rewards

examples: Weekly or monthly popcorn parties

Candy treats passed out on busses

incentives for fundraising or other competitions

examples: Pizza parties supplied by PTO

Boxes of donuts for spirit week winners
